

Gov. Warren Sees Over Serving Out Rest of Term

SACRAMENTO UP — Gov. Earl Warren refused flatly today to say whether he will serve out the remainder of 16 months of his term. The governor, who announced last week he will not be a candidate for reelection in 1954, also refused to discuss possible endorsement of any of the likely gubernatorial candidates.

Warren's decision to retire left the 1954 gubernatorial race wide open.

L. Gov. Goodwin P. Knight, already an announced candidate for reelection, said he would not run for reelection unless he was named as Warren's successor, openly expressing his disapproval of Warren's announcement that he will not seek an unprecedented fourth term.

Knight very nearly campaigned against Warren in the 1950 election, but finally pulled back. For the past few years, however, he has been touring the state with his backers claim he has covered every square inch of the state.

"The field is wide open and Gov. Warren's decision not to run for reelection places me in a position," Knight said, "to increase my chances of being nominated."

Some political observers disagreed with Knight. They expressed the opinion that Warren's decision to get out of state politics encourages several candidates to get in the race, both in the Republican and Democratic camps, and thus detract from Knight's strength.

Sen. Ben Hulse, El Centro Republican, said he did "not turn down a chance" to become governor, but he said he would not run for reelection unless he was named as Warren's successor.

Although Hulse claimed Warren's withdrawal had not changed his own views, there could be no denying that with Warren's retirement, the getting ability gone.

When pressed for more information, Snyder's assistant press secretary said, "There are some details we prefer not to give."

Cold Front Moves in to Coast

Eastern states still sweltered in the summer's worst hot spell, but the cold front was expected to arrive before midnight and assure most of tomorrow pleasant weather for the Labor Day weekend.

Welcome Cold Air

The cool air rolled over Chicago Tuesday night and is now moving eastward at a steady 15-20 mile an hour clip.

The windy day had suffered 10 straight days of 95 degrees or more heat, only one day of scores of new weather records.

In other areas it brought almost 100 degrees in White Plains, N. Y., and 90 in Goodland, Kan.

Maximum temperatures in the 90s and 80s were forecast for most areas touched by the cold front today.

In dealing Washington, D. C., yesterday, three persons died of heat exhaustion, bringing the national total for the last 10 days to more than 120.

The last day of the heat wave in California was a record set on Sept. 7 for the hottest Sept. in the history of the state.

Other new records for the day were set at San Francisco, Cleveland, 101, and Philadelphia, 92.

Socialists Blast Dulles Backing of Konrad Adenauer

BONN, Germany (UP) — The Socialist opposition charged today the open backing of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer by United States Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was "irretrievable intervention" in next Sunday's West German election.

American High Commission officials were upset by the statement. They recalled the furor caused just before the elections in Italy three months ago when U.S. Ambassador Clare Booth Luce made a similar remark.

Adenauer himself tried to take the edge off the situation. The 77-year-old Christian Democrat leader told an election rally in Bonn last night that Dulles, after all, was speaking for and to American people—not the Germans.

Political observers believed election day was so nearby that the secretary's statement yesterday at a Washington press conference would have little effect, maintaining since voters' minds were already made up.

The Socialists sought to damage the position of the pro-Western Chancellor by plastering posters throughout the country calling the Dulles statement proof that Adenauer was an "American tool."

The Communists maintained their efforts to hurt Adenauer's chances by resorting to violence in an effort to sabotage a election.

Dr. Renner Speaks To Exchange Club

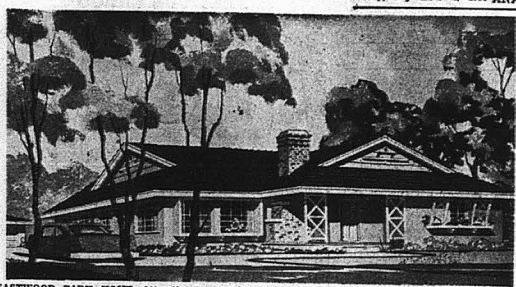

After seven years a prisoner in Siberia, the physician made his escape to China and settled in Shanghai where he became one of the most noted doctors in China. During this time, he served as the personal physician of Chiang Kai Shek and many other notables in China.

During World War II, Dr. and Mrs. Renner underwent many indignities at the hands of the Japanese during the occupation of Shanghai. Following liberation of China by the Allies, the Renners fled to the United States for a vacation and were in San Marino at the time Reds took control of China.

Now a citizen of the United States, the veteran doctor told the Anaheim Club members that he was now eligible for his California physician's license and would soon open a sanatorium in Dana Point. This marked the third visit to the local service club this year in which Dr. Renner told of his life in China.

Four petitions were presented in opposition to proposal of William E. Patterson to maintain a maximum of 20 calves in a five acre pasture on the eastern side of Newport Ave. south of La Colina Dr.

Plans of the Sun Garden Community Chapel to establish a church on the south side of Central Ave. at the end of Wilson St. were rejected on the opposition of 62 persons, the Garden Grove Chamber of Commerce and the Sun Garden Association. Principal objection appeared based on possibility that the narrow streets might be widened on the church property.

Also in disfavor was the application of Motel and Son to establish a trucking business for 10 trucks and trailers on nine acres of land on the northeast corner of Placencia at the intersection of a main Blvd. and La Jolla St., between Anaheim and Placencia. Two residents across the street opposed the application.

Yugoslavia Demands Border Be Cleared

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia (UP) — Yugoslavia threatened to take "corresponding measures" today unless Italy withdraws troops concentrated from the Yugoslav-Italian frontier.

The threat was made in a strong note to the Italian government. The official news agency Tanjug said the note was delivered in Rome by the Yugoslav legation.

It was the fourth protest message by Yugoslavia as the result of the recent flareup resulting from Italian fears that Marshal Tito might try to annex the Yugoslav occupation zone in Trieste. It has been denied emphatically that Tito has any such idea.

Today's note accused Italy of taking military measures along the frontier.

It asserted that Italian troops are not merely massed in the frontier area, but are carrying out demonstrations there.

GUARDING BABY'S EYES

New-born babies come into the world with relatively few defenses against disease germs. Modern science has devised a number of procedures to guard against infection during the first days of life, one of the most important of which is the application of silver nitrate to the newborn's eyes.

Routinely applied within a few minutes after birth, silver nitrate has proved extremely effective in reducing the incidence of eye infections. Occasionally, however, it also causes irritation to the delicate eye membranes.

Occasionally, the irritation is so severe that it causes the child to be hospitalized in Yankton, S.D., requested Dr. T. H. Wilcockson and C. D. Cox to determine what could be used to replace silver nitrate.

The scientists tested two eye ointments, one containing terramycin alone, and the other this antibiotic in combination with another, polymyxin-B.

They concluded that no difference could be determined in the effectiveness against eye bacteria of the antibiotic ointments vs. silver nitrate. However, they added, "nursery personnel" soon prided themselves on being able to distinguish the difference between the two drugs as to the effect on the babies' eyes.

The eyes of the infants treated with silver nitrate, the scientists reported, were reddened and the babies kept their eyes closed for three or four days. But the children treated with antibiotic ointments were bright, open and free from irritation.

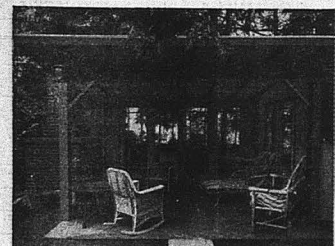
