

## M. AND M. GROUP ENDORSES CITY'S PROJECT OF NEW PARK, NORTH END

Ray Smith Presents Two Plans For Parade Here On Armistice Day

Unqualified endorsement of the new park project was given Wednesday noon by the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association when it met in regular session at the Pickwick Hotel.

Ernest Dupuis, president, presided at the meeting and stated that the city council was anxious to get the reaction of the business men regarding the contemplated establishment of the park and explained the proposal to the assembly. On motion the endorsement of the association as given this date was:

Ray Smith was introduced to the meeting and he explained the forthcoming observance of Armistice day.

"We have always had the support of the merchants of Anaheim and, after all it is your show. The American Legion wants to get your reaction on some of the points especially that of whether or not we should have a motor parade or an evening parade. We feel that the old argument regarding the observance, while we have always enjoyed the complete support of the merchants here could be settled this way. We also believe that an evening parade will enable the stores to remain open until 3 or 4 o'clock. In the afternoon and then they will have an opportunity to get home and back for the parade. There is one point however, we must insist on and that is the two minute observance at 11 o'clock in the morning. That is something that none of us who witnessed the termination of the war can forget and we urge all citizens to pause in memory of those that remained."

E. M. Keath suggested to the chair that the matter be laid over for the next meeting. The meeting being given over to a discussion of what the merchants should do and have it settled for once and for all. His suggestion was accepted by the chair and membership and such was the disposition of the matter.

Dr. Walter Bigham, chairman of the city and county planning commission was then introduced to the meeting and he explained the proposed plan of the commission regarding the routing of highways through the city. He explained the facts relative to locating highways and the reasons for such locations and he made a plea to the business men that they evidence an interest in what the commission was trying to do for the city.

He illustrated his talk with a blue print of the planning commission's plan and told that the plan was still in the making and the blue print was merely tentative.

The next meeting of the association will be held in the Marigold Cafe.

## VINES DESTROYED

In 1883 the phylloxera destroyed all the grape vines in this section and the planting ceased after having been the leading industry here since the inception of the Colony in 1861.

## ORANGES STARTED

People in this section began raising oranges, and that industry grew in great volume. Walnuts and other fruits were raised and business picked up wonderfully.

## ABUNDANT WATER

This section has an abundant water supply for irrigation, coming from the Santa Ana River, secured by riparian rights which were established by the highest courts years ago and remain unimpaired to this day.

## TOWNSITES START

At the height of the land boom, townsites were laid out all over the valley, extending up into the foothill regions and going south to the ocean frontage. Some speculators were so ambitious that their townsites were covered with water when the tides came in.

## INDIANS HELP

Wine making here held the fort for many years. Indians from the Palo Verde reservation came here to help grapes and assist in the hauling and crushing of the grapes.

## GOOD BUSINESS TOWN

Anaheim was always a good business town because the merchants gave their customers a square deal, and the city was rated as one of the best modern towns in Southern California.

## STREET CAR LINE

In the early 80's a street car line was operated on Center Street connecting the Santa Fe Railroad depot on East Center with the Southern Pacific Station at West Anaheim. At one time local men organized a company to extend the line to what is now Yorba Linda. The purpose was to later build the line to Pomona. But when the boom subsided the venture was abandoned.

## NEW PARK PROJECT RECEIVES ENDORSEMENTS OF CITIZENS AND ORGANIZATIONS OF CITY

Checkup With Organizations and Individuals Shows Very Little Opposition To Plan As Set Forth by Proposition

A city-wide checkup of organizations and individuals found but very little opposition to the proposed trade of property which would result in providing Anaheim with an additional park at the north end of the city. This will accommodate the additional numbers who now have difficulty in finding adequate space in the present park.

The Lions Club at its meeting last week gave its unqualified endorsement of the project. Likewise the Merchants and Manufacturers Association at its meeting Wednesday noon endorsed the project. ## PLACENTIA ASKS SCHOOL BONDS BE ISSUED

The members of the Placentia school board will appear before the county board of supervisors with a formal request for the calling of a bond issue for the school district, according to an announcement following a meeting held last Tuesday night.

Although no formal action was taken Tuesday night, the members agreed that the specific issue to be determined later. A tentative figure of \$160,000 was set, funds to provide rebuilding of the school structures that are considered hazardous, and for new construction to replace the Bradford avenue grammar school and auditorium burned last fall. IN THE DAYS OF LONG AGO

Extracts From Files of The Gazette Issued Half a Century and a Quarter of a Century Ago. These Files Contain The Only Authentic History In Print of The Daily Doings of the Citizens of Anaheim and Orange County in the Days of the Pioneers

50 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

AUGUST 15, 1885 Silver is a very scarce article, and business men are put to great inconvenience in making change. This in view of the plethora of silver in the treasury vaults recalls the cry of the Ancient Mariner—water, water everywhere, and not a drop to drink. The circulation of the national government, finding that bankers and others could withdraw silver from the various mints without the amount of "red tape" business, which is necessary to keep the government employees employed, has ordered that all requisitions for silver coin, instead of being sent to the mints, must be sent to the treasurer at Washington, who will in due course of time give the mint superintendents instructions to fill the requisitions. Heretofore, for instance, the Bank of Anaheim when in need of silver, sent a check to the San Francisco mint, and received the silver in a few days. Now, he has to send his order to Washington, and in the indefinite future the necessary order will be given to the mint superintendent to let Mr. Pez James have the silver. The issue of standard dollars for the week ending August 8th was 285,998. The issue during the corresponding week last year was 221,498.

Fairview school reopened on last Monday morning with an attendance of 47 pupils. Ten more promise to put in an appearance next Monday which will embrace the entire scholastic population of the district. The interest manifested by the patrons of the school is attributable to the selection made by the trustees of the teacher, F. S. Wallace, who has served during the two preceding terms. He has given the greatest satisfaction to all concerned.

The sublimity of check was never so exemplified than when the northern immigration association in convention assembled resolved: That in the northern counties of the state all the semi-tropic fruit can be grown as well as in the southern end. That is all gammon and spinach, of course, and is spread out as molasses to catch immigrants. Northern California will become noted for the production of semi-tropic fruits about the time that Fort Yuma will be celebrated as a summer resort.

Mr. D. W. Coquillett returned home on Saturday from the grasshopper afflicted regions where he has been studying the pest, in accordance with the instructions of the Department of Agriculture. He is now preparing his report. Prof. Riley, the Entomologist, writes to Mr. Coquillett that he will probably visit California in September.

The Downey Review says: Parties have been here during the past week paying two and a half cents per pound for pears delivered in Los Angeles. An ordinary pear tree will produce two hundred pounds. One hundred and twenty-five trees to the acre. On such croakers, figure it up! Only six hundred and twenty-five dollars per acre. Our lands are too high, you can't make a living or interest in land with a hundred and fifty dollars an acre. The same party offered two cents and pick the fruit from the tree.

The appropriation of state school funds amounting to \$377,646 has been made among the counties. Los Angeles having 15,218 children between 5 and 17 years of age receives \$22,876.18, being \$1.51 per child. There are 1,136 more children in this county now than there were last year. There are in the state 250,097 children of school age.

When Mr. Selinger returned to Austria after having purchased vineyards here, he took with him a dozen bottles of Mr. Fred Hartung's wine. He reports that about two hundred neighbors sampled the wine and to make it go around the quantum was exceedingly small. But these few bottles of California wine created quite a commotion. 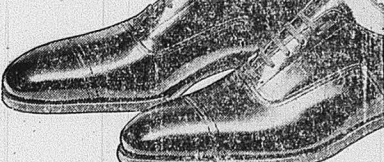

ORDINANCE NO. 345 AN ORDINANCE CREATING AN AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT ALONG THE FRONTAGE OF MANCHESTER AVENUE, RESTRICTING THE USES OF LAND, PROVIDING FOR ISSUANCE OF PERMITS, FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF CERTAIN REGULATIONS, PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR ITS VIOLATION AND STATING THE CIRCUMSTANCES WHICH NECESSITATE ITS BEING MADE IMMEDIATELY EFFECTIVE.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Orange does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. For the public interest, health, convenience, preservation of the public peace, safety, morals, order and public welfare, a temporary district, including home occupations for a portion of the unincorporated territory of Orange County, more particularly described as follows: All lands abutting upon or within one hundred (100) feet on each side of the right-of-way of Manchester Avenue, bounded on the west by the boundary of the County of Orange to the west and by the boundary of the City of Anaheim to the east, and on the south by the intersection of said Manchester Avenue with that certain State Highway, known and designated as U. S. Highway Number 101, at Mirdross Station.

SECTION 2. Until such time as a more comprehensive districting plan may be prepared and become effective, the following regulations shall be in force in said district, as more particularly described above. Except as hereinafter provided, no building or structure erected, reconstructed or structurally altered, nor shall any land, building or premises be used for any purpose or in any manner other than for the following purposes, except that buildings erected and uses established prior to the passage of this Ordinance shall be deemed to be included thereby:

1. Farming, including all types of agriculture, horticulture, and uses customarily incidental thereto, but not including commercial dairies, goat, hog, and

commercial stock-feeding ranches or farms operated publicly or privately for the disposal of garbage, sewage, rubbish or offal. The failure of any owner to remove any building or structure erected in violation of the terms of this Ordinance after personal service upon him of a written demand of the District Attorney of the County of Orange to remove the same and to comply with the terms of this Ordinance shall be deemed a violation of the same and shall be punishable as herein provided.

SECTION 3. The Board of Supervisors may upon the recommendation of the County Planning Commission in each instance, authorize the issuance of a special permit within the above described territory for the use of any property for commercial purposes, provided, however, that no such special permit shall be issued for any of the following purposes:

1. Automobile wrecking establishments or yards. 2. Junk yards and junk warehouses. 3. Automobile service stations providing gasoline storage above ground. 4. Commercial dairies, goat, hog, and commercial stock-feeding ranches or farms operated publicly or privately for the disposal of garbage, sewage, rubbish or offal.

SECTION 4. Before commencing any work pertaining to the erection, construction, reconstruction, moving, conversion, alteration or addition to any building or structure within the territory covered by this Ordinance as described herein, a permit for each separate building or structure shall be secured from the County Building Inspector by the owner or his agent and it shall be unlawful to commence any work upon any building or structure unless said permit shall have been obtained.

ENFORCEMENT, LEGAL PROCEDURE, PENALTIES

LEGAL NOTICE

SECTION 5. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and an conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$500.00 or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Such person, firm or corporation shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day during any portion of which any violation of this Ordinance is committed, continued or permitted by such person, firm or corporation, and shall be punishable as herein provided.

TORTRIX CONTROL EXPLAINED AT WEST ORANGE MEETING

Over 500 citrus growers of Orange county attended the tortrix control meeting called recently by the Agricultural Extension Service at West Orange. The history of the spread of infestation in the county and methods of control worked out by the Citrus Experiment Station were presented by the speakers, Mr. D. W. Tubbs, agricultural commissioner, and Mr. A. J. Dunninger, entomologist of the Riverside experiment station.

Considerable drop of mature fruit has been caused by the work of the tortrix and Helioceera worms. Control measures, according to the speakers, consists of spraying with DDT or dust form. Good results have been secured from this material. If the infestation is present in an orchard that will be sprayed for scale pests, the cryolite may be applied in combination with the oil spray at the rate of 3 pounds of cryolite to 100 gallons of tank mix, or 2 pounds to 100 gallons of oil emulsion.

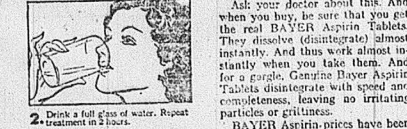

Town Hall, May 28th, 1881. The Board of Directors of the Anaheim Water Company met in regular session. Present, Messrs. Korn, Barr and Melrose. Absent Messrs. Dreyfus and Hartung.

The minutes of the meetings held on May 14th and the meeting held on May 21 were read and approved.

The bill of H. Knappke (No. 15) for \$6.80 was ordered paid.

The receipts of the meeting were: For sale of water, \$12.00, which amount was turned over to the Treasurer at the close of the meeting.

The janitor reported that he had during the week finished the bridge over Kelly's ditch, which the Board had ordered constructed last spring.
